- To support the home/school relationship and ensure that parents are involved and in touch with their child's learning.

For our part of the learning partnership we will:

- Communicate homework requirements through this homework guide.
- Differentiate tasks so that they are appropriate to the individual pupils' needs and abilities.
- Whilst encouraging children to make the best use of ICT at home, ensure that no child is disadvantaged because they do not access to a computer or the Internet
- Positively encourage the completion of tasks
- Consistently follow up on the homework tasks set
- •Mark all homework and offer feedback.
- •Help parents by providing clear written guidance and spending time with any parents who continue to find any aspect of the homework puzzling

How parents can help

• Praise and encourage your child for their effort more than their ability

- Make it clear that you value home learning and encourage your child to meet the deadlines
- Provide a working environment that allows children to do their best and provide a good routine
- Ensure that children's use of ICT is safe and secure (guidance is provided on our website)
- Contact school if any aspect of the home learning is causing problems
- Give support when your child needs help
- Enable your child to visit the library regularly
- Try not to make home learning a burden
- Check with the teacher if child says they have received no homework

By KS2 children should:

- Take responsibility and remember their home learning books
- •Be developing appropriate personal organisation skills
- •Ask the teacher if they are unclear
- •Take their deadlines seriously
